# **Course Summary**







The aim of the BA (Hons) Public Sector Leadership degree program is to provide the theoretical and practical skills required for graduates to become leaders within a range of public sector roles including policing, armed services, and local government. As part of this, the course aims to give students a strong theoretical base in a broad range of subject areas. The programme will have a strong focus on employability, emphasising industry links and wider skills such as mental health in the workplace. Through the introduction of optional modules from CCN's BA(Hons) Psychology with Sociology and the BA(Hons) Business Management students will have access to a wider range of modules which allow them a degree of specialisation as the programme progresses with a view to focusing on their career aims.

## Course Aims

The course also aims to provide a critical space, developing on themes such as decolonisation and post-positivism. As part of this, we are encouraging forward thinking and practical based teaching practice to help develop students in a range of ways. This is essential to ensure the students are well prepared with the critical thinking skills essential for success in the workplace and further education. Themes:

Practical Criminology & Policing	20	Criminology is the scientific study of crime and deviance. In this module the students will be introduced to aspects surrounding the theories and models of crime and deviance and they will explore the nature, extent, cause and prevention and consequences of criminal behaviour. Students will identify which theories could be of assistance to contemporary policing. Police and law enforcement is an integral part of a country's infrastructure aiding in maintaining civil order and preventing and detecting crimes. A sound understanding of the history, role, function, and scope of power provides students with underpinning knowledge of this critical service. Students completing the module will have gained not only knowledge and understanding of the key concepts of criminology but will develop skills in research, discussion, examination surrounding questions such as criminal motivation, policing, and crime prevention.

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Democracy and Politics	20	The module provides an introduction to Democracy and UK politics.
		The module discusses the importance of having a democratic system of government whilst providing students with the means to explore the erosion of democracy in some parts of the political process and the impact this has. It introduces students to the development of the Public Sector within the UK and the influence of both old and new political ideologies in shaping the current public services.
		It also demonstrates the challenges to democracy and the factors associated with the level of participation in the political process. Selected issues covered include the nature of politics and national and international power.

		The study of terrorism and possible counter measure is therefore essential to all those wishing to pursue careers in the public or private security services.
		This module provides a comprehensive understanding of modern conflict, terrorism, counter terrorism and insurgencies. It will equip students with the research skills and knowledge to be able to study and analyses the many aspects of terrorism and insurgencies. Conflict Resolution & British Foreign Policy	20	Strategy Document The purpose of this module is to use scenario- based teaching to engage with the decision- making process that underpins foreign policy. 		The module uses a practical approach which gives the students the opportunity to position themselves as the decision maker. By working in teams, the students will respond to challenges and reflect on their own practice. This will help the students in the workplace to work both make good decisions, challenge their own processes and to engage critically with practice.
		The module will also outline the theories of interstate diplomacy, showing the practical importance of how and where the UK acts on the world stage. This includes with both allies, foes and international organizations. The module will also build on the ideas of grand strategy from the module modern strategy and apply it to the UK.

Organised and White- Collar Crime	20	One of the key concerns to the United Kingdom is the extent of organised and white-collar crime as it affects the economy and society.
		The first part of this module looks at organised crime who can not only influence individual countries but also span borders with international connections across the globe. This transnational organised criminal activity has grown exponentially since the end of the Cold War and in response to modern globalisation.
		The purpose of this module is to acquaint students with the structure and effects of local, national and transnational organised crime. Students will

investigate a range of organised crimes and criminal organisations in both a historic and contemporary context. The module will facilitate students in developing a range of investigatory skills, including examining the scope and nature of methods utilised by criminal gangs.
The second part of this module explores white- collar crime which was first defined in 1939 referring to financially motivated crimes committed by Governments, businesses or the rich and powerful. In today's society, this can tarnish a country's international standing and seriously affect the economy. This part of the module allows the student to explore this unique area of criminology encompassing crimes committed for financial gain, power, serious fraud, bribery and corruption. The student will explore this from different perspectives including the offenders, the victim/s and the public in general. Students will gain an understanding of the capacity of the rich and powerful to define their own offences and punishment. They will be expected to examine specific cases in detail and evaluate the scope and efficacy of the law and the legal systems across the globe and in the UK. More broadly the students will draw links between white collar crime to organised crime and national security.

Practical Criminology & Policing	20	Criminology is the scientific study of crime and deviance. In this module the students will be introduced to aspects surrounding the theories and models of crime and deviance and they will explore the nature, extent, cause and prevention and consequences of criminal behaviour. Students will identify which theories could be of assistance to contemporary policing. Police and law enforcement is an integral part of a country's infrastructure aiding in maintaining civil order and preventing and detecting crimes. A sound understanding of the history, role,







		function, and scope of power provides students with underpinning knowledge of this critical service. Students completing the module will have gained not only knowledge and understanding of the key concepts of criminology but will develop skills in research, discussion, examination surrounding questions such as criminal motivation, policing, and crime prevention.

Democracy and Politics	20	The module provides an introduction to Democracy and UK politics. The module discusses the importance of having a democratic system of government whilst providing students with the means to explore the erosion of democracy in some parts of the political process and the impact this has.

It also demonstrates the challenges to democracy and the factors associated with the level of participation in the political process.

		This research project could be completed in conjunction with local businesses/charities, as well as either student utilising existing data, collecting their own data or undertaking an evaluative project. Each student will be allocated a supervisor who will advise on choice of topic and on the progress of the work.
		Students will be encouraged to use the research project as a summative exercise. Through which to evaluate their own academic progress during the degree programme.
		The dissertation may take the form of either a discursive, structure and evaluative thesis or a data-based project. Learners completing a project will be given an opportunity to envisage, design, and implement a piece of research that will entail collecting, analysing, and interpreting. original data in the light of extant knowledge.

Society, Welfare and International Leadership	20	This module aims to provide an understanding of social welfare in the national and international leadership context. Students will have an opportunity to discuss the nature, rationales and practices of a welfare state and evaluate policies in light of the UK's contemporary welfare issues. Students will also develop an understanding of international leadership and its role in inter/national social welfare. The module provides an opportunity for students to critically engage with contemporary issues and politics in international social welfare as well as to focus their research and assignments on the area resonating with their career pathway plans. Assessment: -
		Policy Brief
Organised and White- Collar Crime	20	Essay One of the key concerns to the United Kingdom is the extent of organised and white-collar crime as it affects the economy and society.
		The first part of this module looks at organised crime who can not only influence individual countries but also span borders with international connections across the globe. This transnational organised criminal activity has grown exponentially since the end of the Cold War and in response to modern globalisation. The purpose of this module is to acquaint students with the structure and effects of local, national and transnational organised crime.
		Students will investigate a range of organised crimes and criminal organisations in both a historic and contemporary context. The module will facilitate students in developing a range of investigatory skills, including examining the scope and nature of methods utilised by criminal gangs.
		The second part of this module explores white- collar crime which was first defined in 1939 referring to financially motivated crimes committed by Governments, businesses or the rich and powerful. In today's society, this can tarnish a country's international standing and seriously affect the economy. This part of the module allows the student to explore this unique area of criminology encompassing crimes committed for financial gain, power, serious fraud, bribery and corruption. The student will explore this from different perspectives including the offenders, the victim/s and the public in







		general. Students will gain an understanding of the capacity of the rich and powerful to define their own offences and punishment. They will be expected to examine specific cases in detail and evaluate the scope and efficacy of the law and the legal systems across the globe and in the UK. More broadly the students will draw links between white collar crime to organised crime and national security.
		Assessment: - Essay Presentation
Race, Racism and Cultural Identity	20	This module provides an in-depth exploration of the sociology of 'race', racism and cultural identity. It considers three related themes: the social origins and significance of racial and ethnic divisions; the (varied) causes, contexts and consequences of racism and antiracism; and the cultural consequences of migration. Each theme will be developed using a combination of theory, research findings and case study material. Although the primary substantive focus of the module will be on race relations in contemporary Britain, insights will be drawn from historical and international comparisons. The module explores sociologically current
		questions of 'race' politics and policy to include the collection and use of racialised data in the criminal justice system (the significance of 'race' categories); debates about the usefulness of the concept of institutional racism (sociology of racism); and globalised Islam (migration and identity). Assessment: - Essay
Psychology and Crime	20	This module aims to provide students with core knowledge and understanding of approaches to explaining criminal behaviour and its impact upon individuals and society. Moreover, it will give an account of psychological factors that help explain crime at both a general level and in terms of specific offences. It looks at how crime commission, crime detection and crime reduction are influenced by psychological factors.
		The possible relationships between psychology and crime have generated a significant amount of public interest in recent years (which is manifested in examples such as the proliferation of films, TV programmes and books on issues such as serial murder). This module will explore







some of the ways in which psychological perspectives contribute to the day-to-day operation of Criminal Justice and our engagements with both perpetrators and victims of crime.

### Course Delivery

The course will utilise an academic year made of 30 teaching weeks with additional assessment/marking periods. For each 20-credit module guidance suggests that some 200 hours or study/work require completion. Each module is split in general terms into taught sessions which include traditional lectures or lessons which aim to introduce key topics, information and utilise teaching and learning tasks and materials. These also guide students towards further independent study to explore taught information more fully and in differing contexts. The programme will be delivered primarily at Easton campus. Some pathway specific modules may be delivered at Norfolk House. Students would be made aware of module delivery location prior to module enrolment. Year one of the course with be delivered at Easton campus. and the Norfolk House Campus to maximise the use of practical and teaching facilities. A range of teaching and learning strategies will be employed throughout the modules that are deemed pertinent to both the needs of the students and employers as well as in accordance with UEA and CCN strategies. Teaching and learning strategies will include lectures, cross programme lectures, seminars, tutorials, practical sessions, group and paired activities, discussion and debate, online materials and forums, research, visits and guest speakers. In accordance with current teaching theories, a large proportion of the curriculum will be self-directed learning (maximising students learning potential). Teaching methods and module schedules are designed to promote a range of skills and to encourage student directed study, learning and reflection. The variety of approaches will enable students of differing learning styles and diverse experience to meet the wide-ranging module outcomes.

The following modules have the potential to develop employer/industry engagement and provide an opportunity for a range of investigative projects, some undertaken with a number of external organisations.

Business Enterprise

These modules along with Professional & Academic Skills, and Research & Investigative Skills will prepare students for their Dissertation in their final year. Supported by a supervisor, students could find themselves collaborating with employers and agencies on these personal projects.

### Course Assessment

The range of assessment strategies will allow the students to be assessed both practically and theoretically and assist the students in their transition into the working environment appropriate to policing, international relations and the public sector.

Assessment takes the following forms, among others:

- Essays
- Literature Reviews
- Project work including proposals, plans, presentations and reports
- Oral Presentations
- Reflective Journal
- Practical Assessments
- Examinations
- Reports

Staff have noted that it is important to provide a range of assessment strategies that relate to both soft and industry specific skills and knowledge. Formative assessment is embedded into the modules to aid student progress and development towards the summative work. The inclusion of term breaks in December and March has enabled more efficient planning of time for both staff and students and has meant live assessments do not encroach on teaching and delivery. The planning of assessment deadlines is co-ordinated across modules and the programme by the Higher Education Delivery Manager. All assessment briefs are internally moderated and examination scripts are reviewed by external examiners prior to distribution. Submitted summative work is marked, internally moderated and reviewed by the external examiner in accordance with UEA policies.

### Course Team

The academic staff delivering this course are drawn from a team that includes teaching specialists and practitioners. All staff are qualified in their subjects with their own specialist knowledge to contribute.

#### Course Costs

The tuition fees that new students pay will be fixed for the duration of the course and will not be subject to any further increases.

Payment of tuition fees is due at the time of enrolment and is managed in accordance with the Course Fees & Eligibility Statement and Rules and Regulations.

Students are likely to incur other costs for books, printing, and other learning materials they may choose to buy. This should amount to a total of not more than £300 per year.
